



REQUIRED NURSING LICENSURE DISCLOSURE (RNLD)

34 CFR 668.14(b)(32) requires all programs that prepare students for occupations requiring programmatic accreditation or State licensure to meet those requirements for all new program entrants (students) starting on July 1, 2024, for each State in which the student is located if they are not enrolled in face-to-face instruction or in a State in which a student attests, they intend to seek employment.

Applicants enrolling in any one of FVI School of Nursing and Technology's pre-licensure nursing programs **must be** a Florida resident **prior** to enrolling and **must agree** to remain a Florida resident while an actively enrolled in a pre-licensure nursing program.

Applicants will be expected to meet the licensure requirements of Florida and seek initial licensure in their home state of Florida.

The **Nurse Licensing Compact (NLC)** allows registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, and vocational nurses to get a multistate license.

Since Florida is member of the **Nursing Licensing Compact (NLC)**, Florida licensed nurses residing in the state of Florida are permitted to work in one of the **41** Nurse License Compact (NLC) States in addition to Florida. One you are licensed in Florida; you may apply for a multi- state license.

As of the date of this publication, nine (9) states are **not part** of the Nurse Compact License agreement. To practice in any of these below states, you will need to **independently seek licensure** in that state:

- Alaska
- California
- Connecticut
- District of Columbia
- Hawaii
- Illinois
- Massachusetts (Application is still pending to Join NLC)
- Michigan
- Minnesota
- Nevada
- New York
- Oregon
- Pennsylvania – (Application is still pending to Join NLC)
- Virgin Islands

If you, as an applicant to the Nursing program plan on practicing in one of the above states, you must disclose this information prior to enrollment, so that the school can determine if the Nursing Program at FVI School of Nursing and Technology will meet the requirement of a non-participating state.
